This small triangle park site was created by the new Massey Heights residential subdivision developed by the city, which turned it over to the Parks Commission for landscaping in 1958. James Lewis Sangster

Born: October 30, 1891

Died: November 5, 1968

Born in Victoria, James Lewis Sangster moved to New Westminster as a young man. "Lewie" Sangster was one of the city's most talented sportsmen, playing lacrosse with the New Westminster Salmonbellies when it won the 1913 Championship Minto Cup.

Sangster joined the Canadian Expeditionary Forces and went overseas during World War I. He briefly served as Treasurer for the City of New Westminster after his return, but left that job to become a successful Insurance Underwriter for Mutual Life of Canada for the next forty years.

Sangster eventually spent more than thirty five years in political life, first as a city councilor, and finally as Mayor from 1949-1950.
