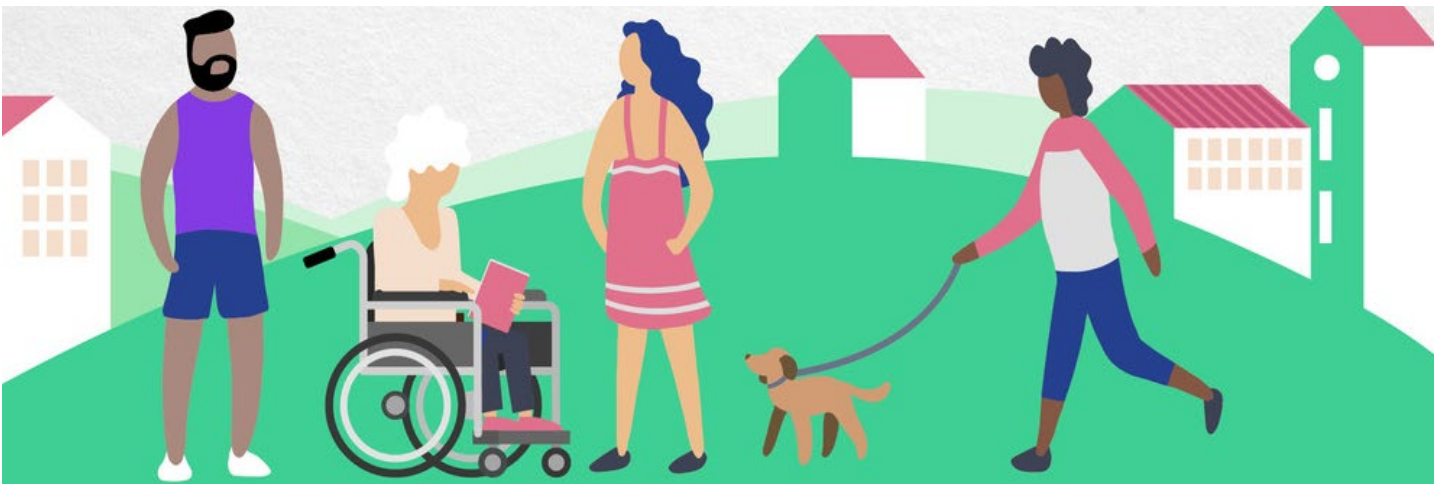


Key Information and Resources for Tenants during COVID-19



Updates

BC Allowable Rent increases: Maximum allowable rent increases for 2022 were capped by the Provincial Government at 1.5% (update: September 8, 2021). If landlords choose to increase rent, they must provide a full three months' notice to tenants using the correct notice of rent increase form. A rent increase freeze remains in effect until December 31, 2021, with rent increases allowed to start on January 1, 2022.

Paying Rent during the COVID-19 Pandemic

Provincial legislation requires that tenants pay rent in full and on time during the pandemic, however, there are a number of support options available to tenants facing financial difficulties as a result of the COVID-19. A list of support resources is provided below:

<p>The Purpose Society</p> 	<p>New Westminister Rent Bank (NWRB); the NWRB offers low-fee, no interest, short-term loans to low income individuals and families that live in the City of New Westminister and are at risk of eviction or essential utility disconnection due to a temporary and unexpected financial crisis. The NWRB also offers assistance with damage deposits, pet deposits and first month's rent for low income individuals and families who are moving into a new residence in New Westminister and are financially unable to meet these expenses.</p> <p>For more information on the New Westminister Rent Bank Program and to apply, please visit the Lower Mainland Purpose Society website or call 604-526-2522.</p>
<p>Seniors Services Society</p> 	<p>Seniors Services Society Seniors Loan Program can offer up to \$1,000 to seniors aged 60 and older who are at risk of eviction due to a temporary shortage of funds, or financial crisis. Funding may also be available for a utility payment or damage deposit, if the person is homeless or their current housing is unsafe or suitable. Funding is provided in the form of short-term interest free loans. For more eligibility and other information, please visit the Seniors Services Society website.</p>

- [Rental Assistance Program \(RAP\)](#) provides financial assistance to eligible low-income working families to help with their monthly rent payments.
- [Shelter Aid For Elderly Renters \(SAFER\)](#) is a rent subsidy program for eligible seniors renting in the private market.
- [British Columbia Housing Benefit](#). This program will help make rent more affordable for select households that do not qualify for other rental assistance programs. The benefit will be distributed to identified priority groups either by non-profit housing providers who will identify and select eligible applicants, or in some cases by BC Housing who will select eligible households from [The Housing Registry database](#)

[Effective July 1, 2021, landlords will be required to apply to the Residential Tenancy Branch \(RTB\) before they can terminate a tenancy agreement for the purpose of renovating.](#) In addition, landlords will not be able to end tenancies for renovations that are not substantial or do not require the rental unit to be vacant.

Government of Canada



[Federal government financial supports](#) include benefits for individuals who are facing a loss of income due to the pandemic as well as other financial supports for low and modest income earners.

In addition to the [regular Employment Insurance benefits](#), there are three other EI benefit programs related to the pandemic (these three other EI benefits will be in place until October 23, 2021):

- [The Canada Recovery Benefit \(CRB\)](#) will provide \$500 per week for up to 26 weeks to workers who have stopped working or had their income reduced by at least 50% due to COVID-19, and who are not eligible for Employment Insurance. **The CRB does not renew automatically. Each 2 week period must be applied for separately.**
- [The Canada Recovery Sickness Benefit \(CRSB\)](#) will provide \$500 per week for up to two weeks, for workers who are sick or must self-isolate for reasons related to COVID-19.
- [The Canada Recovery Caregiving Benefit \(CRCB\)](#) will provide \$500 per week for up to 26 weeks per household for people who are unable to work because they are caring for either children under 12 or dependents with disabilities who cannot attend care, daycare or school due to closures, or who cannot attend care for medical reasons.
